The Long Shadow of Dull Knife

- A respectful account by K W Sercombe

Much is spoken of Chief Sitting Bull, Red Cloud, Crazy Horse and Geronimo. They are spoken of heroes - within their tribal heritage, and beyond.

But what of the Cheyenne leader whose inspirational example - for some - was every bit as historic. Consider Dull Knife and 'the journey' to match any nation's exodus, before or since.

"The wind, a constant whisper across the Oklahoma plains, carried a scent alien to Dull Knife's nostrils. It spoke not of pine and mountain streams, but of dust and a relentless, unforgiving sun. He was a chief of the Northern Cheyenne, a people whose hearts beat in rhythm with the wild heart of the Montana Territory.

Now, in this alien land, confinement chafed at their souls like ill-fitting hides."

The life and legacy left by Dull Knife is, for some, every bit as compelling.

Early Life

Dull Knife, born near the Rosebud River around 1810, had witnessed the slow erosion of his people's freedom. He had seen the treaties broken, the land stolen, the buffalo – the very lifeblood of the Cheyenne – dwindle under the relentless pressure of the white man. What's in a name?

The Cheyenne leader known to the white man as Dull Knife was originally known by his Cheyenne name, **Vóóhéhéve**, which translates to **Morning Star**.

He acquired the name "Dull Knife" (or its Lakota equivalent, **Tamílapǎěšni**) from the Lakota Sioux.

The most common account states that he earned this name after a battle with a Sioux warrior whose buffalo hide shield was so tough that Dull Knife's knife could not pierce it. From that point on, the Sioux referred to him by this name, and it was the name that became widely known to settlers, the U.S. military, and other tribes.

So, while his own people knew him as Morning Star, it was an incident in battle with the Sioux that led to the adoption of the name "Dull Knife" by which he is predominantly known in historical records.

Those Who Followed
